What do the Friends of the Refuge Board of Directors do?

First, let's talk about Friends Groups in general. Friends Groups help support Refuges all over the US. This support is usually in ways that the USFWS staff cannot support the refuge themselves. Friends can lobby on the behalf of the refuge; they can receive donations and grants to help with projects on the refuge, and they can hire their own staff to help with things like education, interpretation, and restoration. All of this is done with the

support, oversight, and approval of the

USFWS staff.

The Friends Group Board of Director's here on the Tualatin River National Wildlife Refuge are people just like you. Our volunteer jobs are to oversee the support the Friends Group gives to the USFWS. To date the Board has raised over \$500,000.00 for the restoration effort of Chicken Creek.

The Board members are also active volunteers on the Refuge. They run the store in the visitor's center; they play an important role in the education, interpretation, and restoration programs. They are at farmers markets, school pro-

grams, and other events promoting experiential education. They are out talking about membership, the Refuge, and outdoor education. Simply put, they are woven into the fabric of this Refuge.

In addition, this Friends Group has six employees. The Board oversees these employees. Here's a little known fact: having employees is weird within the Friends Group world. So weird in fact, other refuges talk about us and they are fascinated by what we have managed to do here. Meet our staff.

Andrew DelGreco is our talented Interpretive Coordinator, if you are a volunteer on the Refuge, you know him. Say hi to Carly Hirschmann, you can see her at the Refuge Tuesday-Saturday helping Andrew with the interpretive program. Together they have reached out to over 144 visitors, volunteers, and group members this month on the Refuge so far. They've been busy putting together the trailside tables, setting up volunteer programs, and welcoming groups like Sherwood Senior Center and the Kiwanis Club. They make sure the visitors center is staffed, and that the Nature Ambassador volunteers are trained and ready to assist the interpretive programming.

Then there's the team of Tiffany Mancillas and Catherine Hudson. Tiffany is our Environmental Education Specialist. Catherine has recently come on board to help Tiffany with the Volunteer Naturalists, school field trips, and drop in exploration days. Tiffany and Catherine have worked with over 330 students and children this month so far. Programs include both onsite and offsite school programs, our own Puddle Stompers program, and developing and staffing drop in exploration days.

Both of those teams: Andrew/Carly and Tiffany/Catherine are performing magic on the Refuge. Their work is overseen by Todd McKinney a USFWS Ranger who has done an amazing job of working with the Friends group and supporting these amazing people, big thanks to Todd.

Natalie Balkam recently came on to help the Refuges biological team and although she is not Friends' staff, we do support her with a small stipend each month for all of the work she is doing. She's going to be focusing on invasive species mapping at both Tualatin River and Wapato Lake. Her work will have an impact on the land for years to come and help in the planning of restoration activities in the future.

Her work is overseen by Curt Mykut, the Refuge Biologist. Nathan Kossnar is our Habitat Restoration Specialist who is on leave until the Fall, but has been instrumental is restoration work on the Refuge. His special focus projects have included second Saturday work parties and outreach with groups looking to get their hands dirty by pulling invasive plants. We are looking forward to Nathans return.

Then we have Bonnie Anderson, Administrator of the Friends Group, and the heart and soul of the Friends. She administers the grants, she takes care of the employees, is on the hiring committee, and she's a Board Member. She has been responsible for the Bird Festival, the Native Plant sale. She makes sure the funding is on track, the wording of our agreements protects the Friends Group and meets our mission, and she carries much of the history of our organization. Without her we would not be the organization that we are today.

All this is to say that it takes team work; the USFWS, the Friends Group, the employees, and the volunteers all coming together to support the causes that are important to us. From restoration projects to education and interpretive programs, to administering the grants, each of us plays an integral part in the actions of supporting the Refuge. We can't forget Larry Klimek, Refuge Project Leader and Eva Kristofik, Deputy Project Leader, without their willingness to work with us none of this would occur. Thank you all.




NATURE'S OVERLOOK STORE

Here are a few of the books we got in for children:


This book is magnificent for young people. It has a glow-in-the dark cover, too! Really excellent. Superb content and great pictures.






And here's a good pick to read to your little one... it's adorable, and all about animals that live around here. And you get the thrill of opening the flaps to see a picture inside...
