WHAT FRIENDS DO: ADVOCACY FOR

ARCTIC NWR

One of the most important things refuge Friends groups do is to advocate for their own refuge and for the refuge system as a whole. This is a role that is taken seriously by our Friends group. Among the current issues that we are actively advocating for is The Arctic Refuge Protection Act (S. 282/H.R. 815).

This critical legislation would restore essential protections for the coastal plain of the Arctic NWR while safeguarding the subsistence rights of Arctic Indigenous peoples. The Tax Cuts and Jobs Act of 2017 mandated two oil and gas lease sales for the coastal plain of the refuge and, despite failure of the first sale, without congressional action, the second sale is still mandated. Restoring protections is in keeping with the majority of the American public who oppose oil and gas drilling in one of America's greatest remaining wild places. Congressional action is needed to prevent the destruction of this treasured wildlife refuge that the Gwich'in people call "the Sacred Place Where Life Begins."



Our Past Friends President, Alan Christensen, spent some of his career working in this area doing research on sockeye salmon and later working with the Elk Foundation and others to rebuy some of the lands that had been exploited for timber. He passed along his deep love for the area to his children, who also value these treasured lands. Alan says, "Alaska is no longer the 'last frontier' to exploit without regard... Tourism, sustainable use of natural resources, and the allure of natural landscapes is a huge economic factor that can outlive drilling for oil."

We have an exciting new addition to the Refuge in the form of Purple Martin Nest Boxes!

Students from the Sherwood High School Key Club came out to help us finish them off with a fresh coat of white paint. We put up 12 boxes total on three separate poles. They are on a pulley-system which allows us to take them down, clean, and store them each year. The boxes are located in the middle of the wetland, and visible from the viewing platform with a scope or binoculars. Here are some frequently asked questions that you may have about them.

Purple Martin FAQ's

What are Purple Martins?

Purple Martins are a brilliant purple swallow, the largest in North America. They were once commonplace in Oregon, but are rare today.

• What are Purple Martin Nest Boxes?

Purple Martins rely almost entirely on manmade structures for nesting. The boxes are designed specifically to keep out European Starlings, the Martin's main habitat competitor. They are also painted white to keep them at a cooler temperature for the birds.

What led to the Purple Martin decline in Oregon?

A combination of competition with invasive European Starlings and changing forestry practices. They rely on manmade nest boxes because there are very few suitable natural nesting sites available.

• Why are they located in the middle of the Wetland?

Purple Martin nest boxes are best suited in open wetland areas which have no tree limbs within 50 ft. and a permanent nearby water source.

• Will they be disturbed if they are located so close to the seasonal trail?

Purple Martins actually fare better and prefer nesting sites that are closer to humans. Nests that are within 120 ft. of human activity are more likely to be occupied.

What are some benefits of Purple Martins?

Aside from being beautiful, Purple Martins are good pest control because they eat flying insects such as beetles, flies, wasps, and moths.

Can I get a closer look at the nest boxes?

Yes! The seasonal trail, open on May 1, passes by the nest boxes

• When will the Purple Martin's be here?

Although there is no guarantee that they will show up in the first year, Purple Martins usually arrive in early to mid-June



New Refuge Phone System

The Refuge has new phones and a new phone system. Now when you call the main Refuge number you will get an automated menu with options for: a directory, hours of operation, trail status, and getting re-routed to the state Fish & Wildlife office for injured wildlife calls. To reach someone at the Refuge, you can either wait and listen through the menu or use the first option of the directory to be connected to a specific person. If anyone was in the habit of using previous extensions, they now have '15' added to the beginning of the number (e.g. Friends office extension is now 15227).
